Land Acknowledgement

PINAY POWER II: Celebrating Peminisms in the Diaspora is being held in Tiohtià:ke, on greater Turtle Island. Both Canada and the Philippines share a long history of colonization, but also long HERstories of resistance such as Idle No More. As we refuse the settler colonial lie by acknowledging that Columbus did not "discover" the Americas and Cartier did not "claim" Canada for France; but happened upon well established and culturally rich Native societies. Similarly, Magellan did not discover what we understand today as the Philippines. The Tao*, the Philippines' indigenous peoples, were a highly complex society with deeply instituted communities, ways of life, languages, governments, and spiritualities. During these periods of forced occupation all the way to the present day, our people have experienced a loss of land, culture, and identity, and forced displacement. As we bear this in our hearts, minds, and spirits, we wish to acknowledge, show respect, and support the empowerment of the Indigenous peoples native to the land and waters on which our gathering will be taking place. The traditional stewards of this land are the Kanien'kehá:ka people, also honourably bestowed with the title of Keepers of the Eastern Door. The **PINAY POWER II** team has asked for permission from these elders of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy to host this conference, and we are honoured that they have welcomed us on their territory and agreed to partake in our opening ceremonies to connect our communities, welcome visitors from across the diaspora, and share offerings and gifts. We express our humble gratitude to this land and its people.

About the Conference

pinay Power II: Celebrating Peminisms in the Diaspora is a gathering of self- identified Pinays (Filipinas), including queer and transwomen, in the diaspora. The first Canadian academic and community conference bringing together Filipina scholars, activists, artists, community and cultural practitioners, PINAY POWER II is an intentional intervention for the creation of a peminist (Filipina feminist) agenda for the 21st century.

How this conference began

PINAY POWER II came about due to a Facebook Live notification I received back in March 2018. Monica Batac and Karla Dannan were hosting a podcast out of Toronto and tagged me. I don't usually pay attention to FB notifications but this one time I did, joining the podcast just as they were talking about my book, Pinay Power: Peminist Critical Theory: Theorizing the Filipina/American Experience (2005) and how they wanted to do a new edition in 2018. I had just been thinking about the same thing —that my book was very overdue for a revision to capture all the wonderful new peminist academic, activist, creative and community-led praxis that has emerged in the last 15 years-and I typed in something like "YASS, would love to help you with this!" Monica and Karla were a little shocked that I was there listening, but it was obviously meant to be. Be it fate or karma, stars aligned soon afterwards as I applied for and was awarded the Muriel Gold Visiting Professorship at McGill, which enabled my residence in Montreal. Over the summer and into the fall our team created and submitted the huge SSHRC grant for the conference, which we were awarded in January 2019...and here we are!

Each of us here is part of this historic peminist intervention. Kapwa, dharma, and our ancestors have called us together here so far away from our homeland, on this native land. In radical love and solidarity we welcome you into this amazing space of peminist theorizing, making and learning. My heart is so full. Isang bagsak!





